«Somniatic»

The installation is inspired by traditional early 19th century toys and curriousities. Snow globes, shadow puppets, camera obscuras, kinetoscopes, flip books, Stereo-grams and silhouetted carousel lanterns all provided narrative story lines with basic principals involving light, shadow, movement and optics. Precursors to modern day film techniques, these processes provided temporary amusement and created a peep-hole view into miniature worlds and dioramas which vanished when the illusion ended. Instead of «reading» from left to right, these narratives unfurled in front of the viewer in a fixed spot. The illusion of continuous motion was generated simply by staring long enough in the same spot as images moved in front of the lens or peep-hole.

In «Somniatic» a candle light vigil unfolds as the scene rotates in a 360 clockwise motion. The camera is fixed, but each rotation of the snow-covered wooded scene spins slightly more quickly than the last. Just like with a flip-book or a penny arcade machine, the video positions the camera and viewer in a static position. the activity moves in front of a stationary camera and provides a short vignetted scene for the audience.

The snowy outdoor scene houses two illuminated tents. Like lanterns, they project enough light to create a series of silhouetted images. As the miniature landscape spins for the camera, the silhouetted scenarios unfolding inside the tents change and so do the proportions of the characters involved. Figures become miniaturized or exaggerated into giant crouching shapes in the same way that a candle placed at the right distance can throw a distorted silhouette or shadow across a room.

The people inside the tents are engaged in a number of ritualistic activities. As the scene continues to spin faster and out of control, the activities in the tents become more hectic and fast paced until the peep-hole closes and the illusion disappears.

In his multi-faceted artwork, Anthony Goicolea explores themes ranging from personal history and identity, to cultural tradition and heritage, to alienation and displacement. His diverse œuvre encompasses self-portraits, landscapes, and narrative tableaux executed in a variety of media, including black-and-white and color photography, sculpture and videos installations, and multilayered drawings on Mylar.

Best known for his powerful, and often unsettling, staged photographic and video works, Goicolea made his artistic debut in the late 1990s with a series of provocative multiple self-portrait images. These early works features groups of young boys on the threshold of adolescence, acting out childhood fantasies and bizarre rituals of revely and social taboo in highly staged domestic or institutional settings or dense, fairytale forests. Revealing a playful self-consciousness, then often consisted of complex composites of the artist himself, in all manner of poses.

Soon thereafter, Goicolea garnered international attention with his ambiguous yet strangely compelling landscapes, ranging from dream-like Woodland environments to vast, unforginving urban and industrial wastelands. The artist has created several series of digitally composited, and heretofore uncharted, topographies, often populated by bands of masked and uniformed figures. In recent series, many of the images are devoid of humans, although the landscape reflects an anonymous and increasingly tenuous human presence. In these works, primitive lean-tos and crudely constructed shanties coexist in an uneasy union with the technological vestiges of an industrialized society. Suggesting a world on the brink of obsolescence, these chilling images further cement the persuasive undercurrent of human alienation – from one another as well as the natural environment – that can be traced throughout the artist's work.

Remarkably prolific and intentive, Goicolea continues to intrigue his viewers with meticulously crafted, thought-provoking works. The artist has exhibited widely in group and solo exhibitions throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia – notably at the Museum of Contemporary Photography, Chicago, Illinois ; the Corcoran Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C. ; the International Center of Photography, New York ; Postmasters Gallery, New York ; Haunch of Venison Gallery, London, United Kingdom ; Galerie Aurel Scheibler, Berlin, Germany ; the Groninger Museum, the Netherlands ; and the Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofia, Madrid, Spain. Alter Ego : A Decade of Work by Anthony Goicolea is the first major museum exhibition devoted solely to his work.

Goicolea's art is held in many public collections, including those of the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, and the Museum of Modern Art, New York ; as well as the Yale University Art Collection, New Haven, Connecticut ; the North Carolina Museum of Art, Raleigh ; and Telfair Museums, Savannah, Georgia.

To date, Goicolea's work has been the subject of three books. It has been featured in several anthologies as well as ARTnews, Art in America, the New Yorker, the New York Times, the Los Angeles Times, the Advocate, the Chicago Sun-Times, and the Chicago Tribune, among many other publications. The artist's recent grants and awards incude a Cintas Fellowship (2006) and the BMW Photo Paris Award (2005).

Goicolea holds a B.A. in art history, with a minor in romance languages, and a B.F.A. in drawing and painting – both earned at the University of Georgia, Athens, in 1992 and 1994, respectively. He received an M.F.A in sculpture, with a minor in photography, from Pratt Institute of Art, New York, in 1996.

Our gallery shows on an alternate basis young emerging artists and major internationally renowned photographers who had never benefited from a solo show in France (Byung-Hun Min, David Hilliard, Todd Hido, Michael Wolf, Mona Kuhn, etc.). We have built up tight relationships with both French and foreign institutions, journalists, as well as collectors.

Last May 2012, the opening of our second gallery in the same street allowed us to diversify our programming, and show more intimate, acute and innovative works, as well as video.

Whatever their medium of choice, our artists all share as their core key subject, the identity building. The forecoming shows in 2013 will pursue that theme : Anthony Goicolea (March-April), David Hilliard (May–June), Ethan Murrow, Berni Searle (November).

Next Summer 2013, La Galerie Particuliere will open a 3rd gallery in Brussels (Belgium) and will bring our artists a complete and coherent european awareness, thus allonwing us to better explain and promote their work.
